Draper, Sharon Out of My Mind


Eleven-year-old Melody is the smartest kid in her whole school but most people don't think she's capable of learning because she can't talk.



A hilarious and heartfelt novel in which one middle-school troublemaker accidentally moves into the gifted and talented program—and changes everything.




Stead, Rebecca When You Reach Me (Newbery Award Winner)


O'Dell, Scott The Island of the Blue Dolphins (Newbery Medal Winner)

A spirited tween narrator tells a harrowing tale of love, loss, and looking out for each other as homeless kids in India facing hardship with dreams and determination.




O'Brien Mrs. Frisby and the Rats of NIMH (Newbery Medal Winner)

Sweet and poignant novel told from the point of view of a rescued pit bull, Daisy, as she trains to be a service dog for an injured veteran and his family.




Johnson, Jaleigh The Quest to the Uncharted Lands *

The Secret Garden



An entertaining introduction to history told through humor and time travel.




Moss, Marissa Nurse, Soldier, Spy : The Story of Sarah Edmonds, a Civil War Hero
